*Answers may include, but are not limited to:

1. What did you learn from hearing their story?

- **a.** Not all Jews in Nazi-occupied Europe were in concentration camps. Some hid, some lived under false identities, some were partisans.
- **b.** Aron and Lisa were very resourceful, determined, and brave in the face of epic danger
- c. The war continued even after Aron and Lisa were liberated.
- d. Aron and Lisa's families were murdered in occupied Poland.
- e. Jewish partisans lived in the forests, fought against the Nazis and their collaborators, and helped fellow Jews to survive. This was a risky and dangerous way of life.

- h. Antisemitism (in Europe following the war and in America).
